⁴ A child victim is defined as a child who is the subject of a maltreatment report for which the disposition is substantiated, indicated, or "alternative response victim." Data on foster care entry rate, children in foster care on 9/30, and children adopted are from AFCARS.

⁵ As of 2012, there is a new methodology used to calculate the caseworker visits measures. Because the new methodology limits data comparisons with prior years, caseworker visits data from 2009 through 2011 are not included in this table. All states have the option of using an approved sampling procedure for the caseworker visits reporting requirement. See appendix C for more information on how these data are calculated and for a list of states using sampling methodology.

⁶ The unique count of child victims counts a child only once regardless of the number of times he or she was found to be a victim during the reporting year. This is a change from prior reports, and these data are now consistent with the reporting practice in the Child Maltreatment reports.

⁷ The rates for Child Protective Services Responses and victims are per 1,000 children under age 18; for fatalities, the rate is per 100,000 children under age 18.

STATE COMMENT

The following are New Mexico's comments on the state data presented in *Child Welfare Outcomes 2009–2012: Report to Congress*.

New Mexico is distinguished by its racial and ethnic composition. Persons of Hispanic (any race) and of American Indian origin account for more than 50% of New Mexico's estimated two million inhabitants. This is a significantly higher proportion of these minority groups than seen nationally. Thus, New Mexico's population demographics necessitate child- and family-serving agencies to meet needs specific to multicultural populations and to address unique sovereignty issues with tribal governments.

In recent years, New Mexico has been faced with many challenges related to child welfare. Increasing poverty, tougher cases, and high staff turnover rates have all had an impact on our outcomes. In response, New Mexico has developed a practice model which incorporates both Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) and Adaptive Leadership. New Mexico is currently entering Phase 3 of implementation of our Practice Model, and all counties will be implemented in summer 2014. The practice model articulates the vision, mission, values, and operating principles in a manner that inspires, empowers, and engages staff and partners, creates commitment, and provides clarity and direction in our work. The Practice Model promotes achievement of safety, permanence, and well-being outcomes and employs a strengths-based approach by building on what is working. The state has embraced the use of CQI and Adaptive Leadership to identify, describe, and analyze strengths and problems. We then test, implement, learn from, and revise solutions.

New Mexico will continue to actively incorporate CQI and Adaptive Leadership into our practice. Adaptive Leadership is the practice of mobilizing people to recognize and intervene in challenges that are hard to define and for which existing knowledge structures or processes are not sufficient to bring about the desired change. Adaptive Leadership provides a framework in which provides adequate time to identify, diagnose, and address challenges.

With such efforts, New Mexico continues to work through both data quality management and through child welfare practice refinement and analysis to assure positive outcomes for children and families statewide. We have seen changes in practice and believe that our outcomes will improve in the next year.
