⁴ A child victim is defined as a child who is the subject of a maltreatment report for which the disposition is substantiated, indicated, or "alternative response victim." Data on foster care entry rate, children in foster care on 9/30, and children adopted are from AFCARS.

⁵ As of 2012, there is a new methodology used to calculate the caseworker visits measures. Because the new methodology limits data comparisons with prior years, caseworker visits data from 2009 through 2011 are not included in this table. All states have the option of using an approved sampling procedure for the caseworker visits reporting requirement. See appendix C for more information on how these data are calculated and for a list of states using sampling methodology.

⁶ The unique count of child victims counts a child only once regardless of the number of times he or she was found to be a victim during the reporting year. This is a change from prior reports, and these data are now consistent with the reporting practice in the Child Maltreatment reports.

⁷ The rates for Child Protective Services Responses and victims are per 1,000 children under age 18; for fatalities, the rate is per 100,000 children under age 18.

The following are Wisconsin's comments on the state data presented in *Child Welfare Outcomes 2009–2012: Report to Congress*.

The child welfare system in Wisconsin is state-supervised and county-administered in 71 counties and state-administered in Milwaukee County through the Bureau of Milwaukee Child Welfare (BMCW). Wisconsin's current focus areas are:

- **Re-balancing the Child Welfare System:** Because we know that removal of a child from his family is a traumatic experience, we are seeking to serve more families with intensive in-home services, rather than out-of-home care, whenever possible. We are training staff to think carefully and systematically about safety and how in-home supports and services can be used to maintain a child safely in his own home.
- **Preserving Connections to Family and Least Restrictive Settings:** When a child is placed in out-of-home care, we seek a familiar, familial setting with a relative whenever possible. We also recognize the importance of placing children in the least restrictive and natural setting. As a result of our efforts, 33% of Wisconsin children in out-of-home care live with relatives and 85% of Wisconsin children are placed in a family setting with a relative or foster parent.
- **Achieving Timely Permanence:** Wisconsin is applying a heightened urgency and creativity to achieving permanency for children in out-of-home care. We have implemented national best practices, including permanency roundtables, subsidized guardianship, and trial reunifications that are designed to help achieve permanency more quickly and successfully.
- **Strengthening Families:** Children in Wisconsin re-enter out-of-home care at a rate that far exceeds the federal standard; we are committed to reducing this rate. Through a newly approved Title IV-E waiver, we are implementing a post-reunification supports program to provide services to children and families in the initial 12 months following reunification to help families stay stable, reduce the recurrence of maltreatment and re-entry, and improve the well-being of these families.
- **Applying Trauma-Informed Principles:** We are incorporating trauma-informed principles into our child welfare system and other systems that serve children and families. Research has shown that abuse, neglect, or other traumatic experiences in childhood impair a child's social, emotional, and cognitive development and health. Utilizing trauma-informed approaches can help the children in our child welfare system heal and live healthy, fulfilling lives.
- **Strengthening Health and Education Outcomes:** Wisconsin is engaged in cutting-edge data exchange and programmatic collaborations with the educational and health systems to increase understanding of the educational and health outcomes of the children in the child welfare system and to develop effective strategies to improve the educational success and health status of these children.
- **Supporting Youth Transition to Adulthood:** Youth who age out of foster care face significant challenges, including high rates of unemployment and homelessness, low rates of high school graduation and post-secondary education, and a high probability of incarceration. Wisconsin has created a new Office of Youth Services in the Department of Children and Families to provide a stronger, more holistic focus on services and supports for at-risk youth.

Through these efforts, we expect to enhance the safety, stability, healthy, and quality of life for the children, families, and communities in our state.
